He is currently the 11th President of the Nobel Peace Prize-winning Pugwash Conferences on Science and World Affairs; Deputy Chairman of the Governing Board of the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) and on several other advisory boards of international bodies. As a Sri Lankan diplomat Dhanapala served in London, Beijing, Washington D.C., New Delhi and Geneva and represented Sri Lanka at several international conferences chairing many of them including the historic NPT Review and Extension Conference of 1995. Dhanapala has received many international awards and honorary doctorates, has published five books and several articles in international journals and lectured widely. Jargalsaikhan ENKHTSAIKHAN is Ambassador-at-Large of Mongolia. He represented his country at the United Nations in New York. Though professional diplomat, he served as the legal and national security advisor to the first democratically elected President of Mongolia and, as such, in 1994 organized the drafting, consideration and adoption by the State Great Hural (parliament) of the country's first national security and foreign policy concepts as well as the basis of its military policy. He reported these findings at the 1st International Conference on Humanitarian Aspect of Nuclear Weapons held in Oslo in 2013 and also presented a research study on the various effects of the use of nuclear weapons at the 2nd Conference held at Nayarit, Mexico in 2014. He has been Chairman of Organizing Committee, Nagasaki Global Citizen's Assembly for the Elimination of Nuclear Weapons since 2009.</p>
